

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Toy Drive spreads Christmas Cheer

On Friday December 15th 2018 Sterling Radio hosted its sixth annual Toys for Tots Toy Drive. "The idea for the toy drive started in class on a whiteboard" said Rob Strauss, radio broadcast teacher, and co-founder of the Toy-Drive. "A small class wanted to do a live broadcast with community involvement and that's how the toy drive began." The goal of the toy drive is to collect toys for families in need in the surrounding area who may not be able to afford toys during the holiday season. This year the secondary goal was to beat the previous year's total of toys collected with 1034 and if that goal was reached, Mr. Strauss would take a polar plunge in a pool full of ice water.

The day started off strong, by 7:35 the amount of toys reached 241, surpassing what was raised the inaugural year. That number kept steadily rising and rising throughout the morning as more and more classes came out and students dropped off toys. At about 9:22 Santa Claus made an appearance, coming in on a fire truck decorated as his sleigh.

As the day went on the community outreach continued, members of the Somerdale Police Department dropped off three squad cars full of toys. Along with many Sterling alumni who made appearances and donated toys.

During the event there were many live contests and shows such as a cookie eating and eggnog drinking contest, a frozen t-shirt contest where contestants had to try to free a t-shirt from a block of ice, and a "guess that holiday song" project where contestants had to guess holiday tunes played on a piano, and Holiday Movie Trivia. Along with a Gingerbread House competition between the four grades, won by the senior class of 2019.

However the amount of donations hit a lull during the afternoon, being 300 donations down with three hours left in the school day, many of the students began to wonder if they were going to break the record at all. Radio Student and Sterling Senior Albert Tang said "We expected the toys to come in waves, and we had a wave in the morning then a period of doubt where there were few toys coming in, but in the end we had another wave of toys come in and we were good."

And in the end the sixth annual sterling toy drive collected 1051 toys breaking last year's record and reaching the goal. Radio student and Sterling Senior Logan Medeiros told us "Everyone contributed, it was a very overwhelming feeling that we weren't going to break it and it was close, but we pulled it off last minute and in the end it was a very good feeling."



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Winter Concert

There are many who will viciously debate the right time to start listening to holiday music. Most wait religiously until after Thanksgiving, and will argue to no ends with any fool who disagrees. They proclaim, often in anger that Christmas is edging earlier every year. On the other hand, those who have more spirit than patience will start playing their sleigh bell-saturated tunes the moment Halloween has ended. These are the ones who decorate so early that their Christmas trees are undeniably dead by the New Year. At some point or another, though, all students of the Sterling High School concert band have learned to modify their preferences - it is no later than the first week of September that they blast the holiday cheer in daily rehearsals, having only just left summer behind. The experience, though necessary, is one of the strangest ones imaginable, since a student may find him- or herself asking friends about their summer vacations, and immediately afterwards learn how to play Leroy Anderson's "Sleigh Ride". However, willingness to encounter absurdity is one of the most necessary tools for anyone who plans to participate in the Sterling High School concert band, and if you join without it, it won't be long before you acquire the skill.

In this year's winter concert, the strangeness began in low doses- one of the band's first pieces featured only some light shouting. In a piece entitled "We Wish You a Mambo Christmas", the band played elements of Latin music to the melody of the notquite-titular classic Christmas carol. The performance was a point of pride for the band, characterized by complex rhythms and harmonies inspired by the better-known "Mambo" from West Side Story. All in all, an interesting and generally normal tune, with the exception that the band collectively shouted "MAMBO" at the halfway point. Mid-music shouting is nothing the band hasn't tackled before, and nothing they wouldn't do again, so this one can be considered an appetizer of unusual- in spirit, foreshadowing what is to come.



The true spectacle, however, was yet to arrive. The pinnacle of the show's absurdity was almost entirely unprecedented, with only a brief introduction saying that the band would be playing "Snow Miser/Heat Miser" from A Year Without a Santa Claus. The audience had no reason to expect the character that would leap out onto the stage before them. Senior and trombone player Matt DiGialleonardo, with a grey wig and blue scepter, danced onto the stage and sang, in a manner that was clearly intentionally awful, the entire anthem of the Snow Miser, with enthusiastic accompaniment from the band, and even more enthusiastic support from the percussionist backup dancers. His resemblance to the elderly ruler of ice was, oddly enough, uncanny, and the band put on the most thoroughly entertaining show yet seen.

One would assume that this would be the best of it, an insurmountable record of ridiculousness set by the music program. But alas, Matt was off the stage for barely a moment before the music started again, and out marched an image that was, impossibly, more nonsensical than the last. In representation of the Heat Miser, Steven Wells, senior and saxophonist, replaced the Snow Miser's chill with a frighteningly spiky red wig and a matching clown nose (a characteristic which was, of course, reflected in the backup dancers). With no better vocals than the former performance, and not an ounce less enthusiasm, the Heat Miser's song, despite being musically straightforward, was a show to behold and a sight to be seen

The Camden County Office of Education gave Sterling High School approval for Educational use in this building. All NJROTC instruction will take place in the new location starting in February 2019.

We are at the midway point in the 2018-19 school year and are pleased with many aspects of life at Sterling but we are constantly looking to improve. The mid-year point is a good time to assess how things are going, what we have learned, and how to prepare for what's next.



The biggest developments at Sterling deal with completed construction projects. First on the list has been the completion of the work on Warwick Road. The new turning lanes, curbing, and general road improvements has had a positive impact on the traffic flow around Sterling. Secondly, our foods room has opened after several months of construction. The improvements are dramatic as we transformed from kitchens from the 1970s to modern kitchens. Our foods room now includes eight workstations, stronger ventilation hood system, high efficiency appliances, new refrigeration system, high out-put stoves, a handicapped accessible station, and a teacher demonstration kitchen with video monitors and projection. Mr. Riley and his students are enthused about the upgrades and excited about their current and future experiences in the Culinary Arts. Finally, our athletic field construction is complete and this spring will be the first time in three years where we will have our entire athletic complex open for activity. The most recent work was the completion of the "JV" side of the complex where we leveled out two athletic fields and reset our baseball field. At Sterling High School, we understand the importance of our activities beyond the school day and are confident that upgrades to our complex will serve our current and future students as well as our community groups who use our facilities. We encourage Sterling community members to support the various sports and activities at Sterling and to check out the facilities.

Linda Heuschkel, a Physical Education Teacher since 1981, is retiring on January 31, 2019. Ms. Heuschkel has been an integral member of the staff through her teaching, coaching, SEA involvement, and general support of Sterling students for over thirty-eight years.
