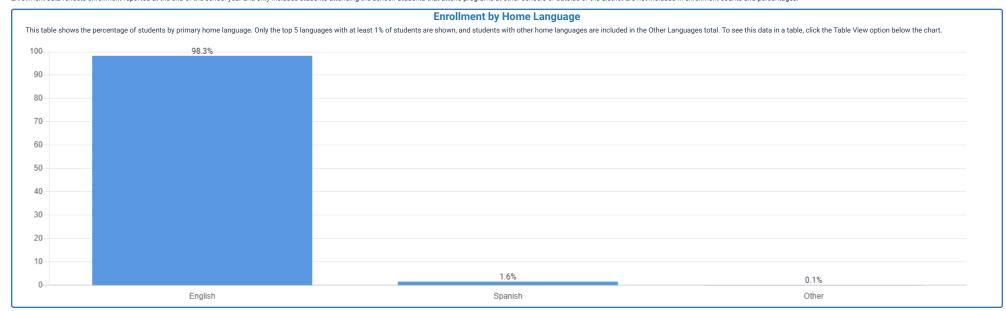

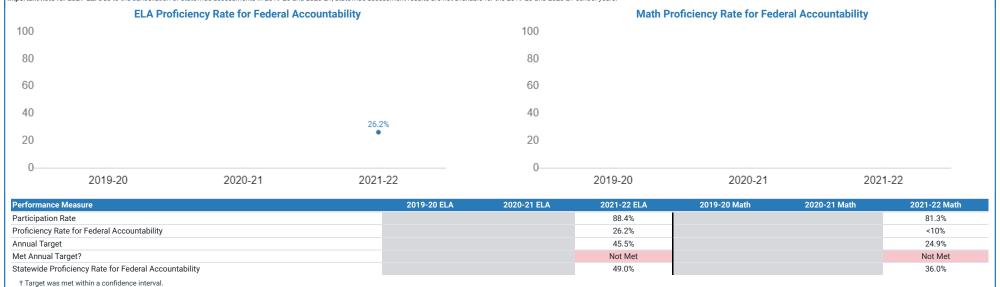
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English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

Important note for 2021-22: Due to the cancellation of statewide assessments in 2019-20 and 2020-21, statewide assessment results are not available for the 2019-20 and 2020-21 school years.





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English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts(ELA) both overall and by students group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA assessments. NJSLA results include only students in grades 3 through 9. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA assessment.

This table shows both the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows progress towards meeting the state's long term goal of 80% proficiency by 2032. Annual targets are specific to each subgroup, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet the state's long term goal. 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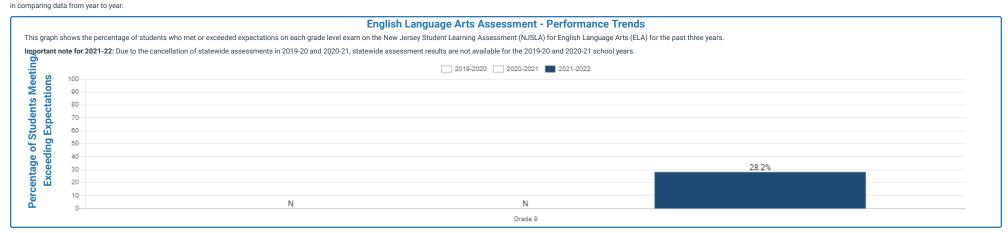

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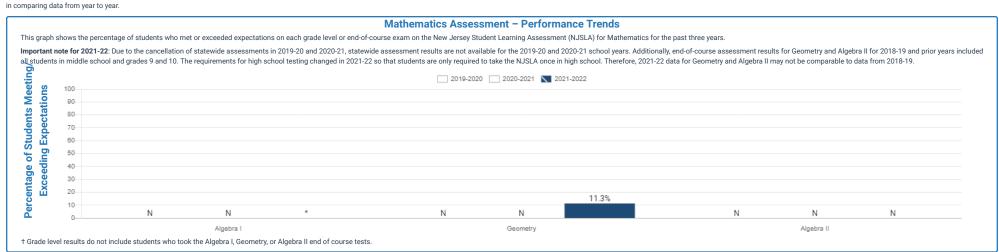
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Mathematics Assessment - Performance By Test: Algebra I

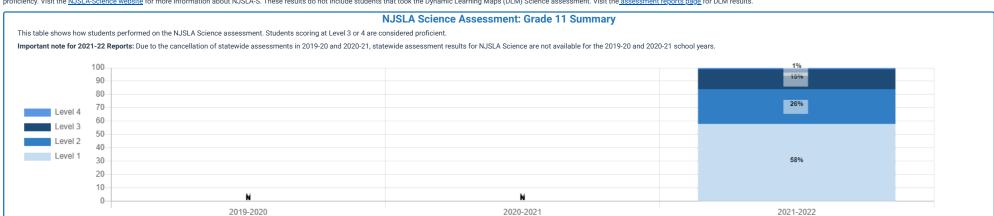
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Academic Achievement

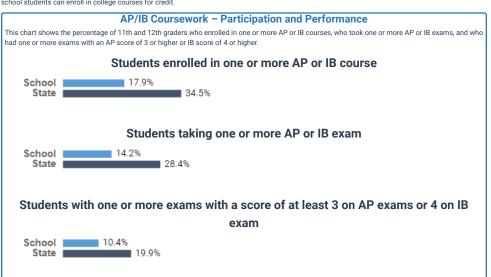

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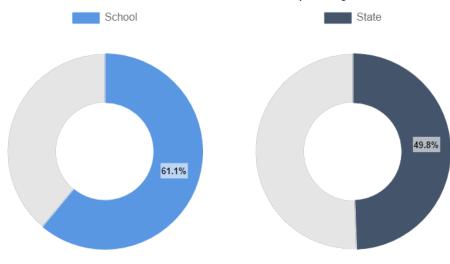

Grades 9-12:Students enrolled in one or more visual and performing arts classes





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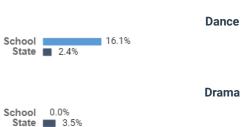
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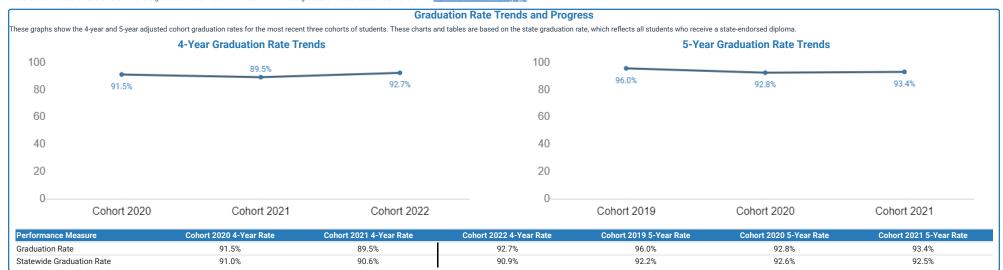
Graduation/Postsecondary

Graduation rates are calculated based on the adjusted cohort graduation rate for federal reporting and accountability purposes. The United States Department of Education (USED) determined that the NJDDE must only include students who receive a diploma that is fully aligned with the state's standards, meaning they have met the state's graduation assessment requirements, course requirements, and local attendance requirements. This means that students who did not meet some or all graduation requirements because of modifications or exemptions in their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) may not be counted as graduates in the calculation and accountability purposes. It is important to note that this is only a change to how graduation rates are calculated for federal reporting. It does not affect requirements to earn a diploma or the type of diploma that the state awards to students with disabilities.

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Graduation/Postsecondary

Graduation rates are calculated based on the adjusted cohort graduation rate for federal reporting and accountability purposes. The United States Department of Education (USED) determined that the NJDDE must only include students who receive a diploma that is fully aligned with the state's standards, meaning they have met the state's graduation assessment requirements, and local attendance requirements. This means that students who did not meet some or all graduation requirements because of modifications or exemptions in their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) may not be counted as graduates in the calculation are to support the state's graduation rates are calculated for federal reporting. It does not affect requirements to earn a diploma or the type of diploma that the state awards to students with disabilities.

As a result of these changes, the NJD0E began calculating two versions of the adjusted cohort graduation rate starting with 2021 graduation rates. The "federal version" aligns with ESSA requirements and USED guidance and will be used for federal reporting and ESSA school accountability only. The "state version" continues to use the same methodology used prior to 2021 and reflects all students who received a state-endorsed diploma.

For the "federal version" of the 2022 graduation rates, students with disabilities who did not meet either the state course requirements, local attendance requirements, and/or state graduation assessment requirements for graduation because of a modification or exemption in their IEP were not included in the graduates count (the numerator), but they will remain in the adjusted cohort (the denominator). Because graduation assessment requirements were waived for 2021 graduates, the "federal version" of the 2021 graduation rate only excludes students with disabilities who did not meet either the state course requirements and/or local attendance requirements.

In this section of the reports, the Graduation Rate Trends and Progress charts and Graduation Cohort Profiles (4-Year, 5-Year, and 6-Year), as well as the graduation rates reported in the Summary Reports, reflect the "state version" of the graduation rate. 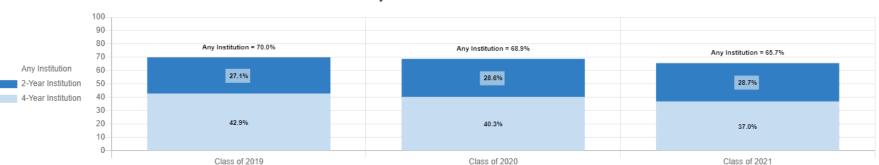

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Climate and Environment

The New Jersey Department of Education used input from New Jersey communities to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

Important Note for 2021-22: The NJD0E recommends caution in comparing the 2021-22 chronic absenteeism rates with the rates from 2020-21 and rates prior to 2019-20 as the pandemic has impacted attendance rates over the last three years.

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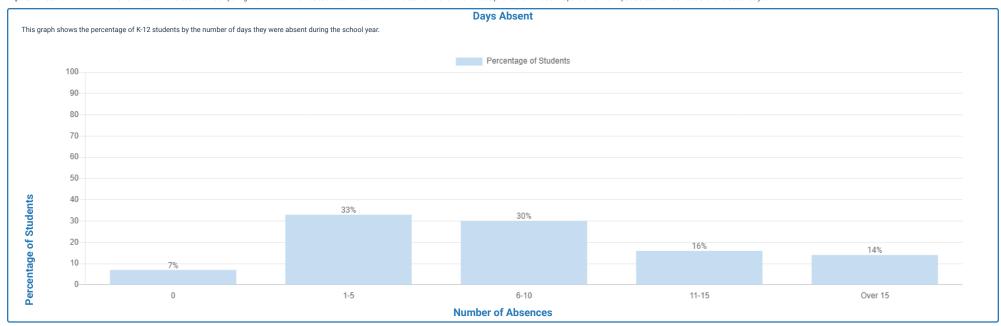
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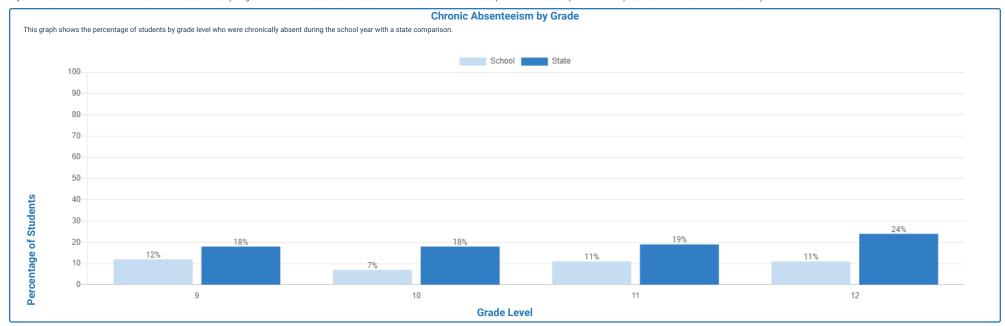

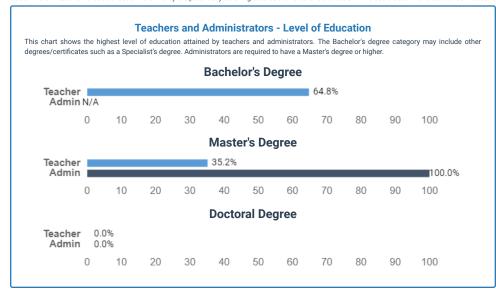

Important Note for 2021-2022: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, New Jersey received waivers from the United States Department of Education (USED) in both March 2020 and March 2021 that waived accountability-related requirements in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years. These waivers removed the requirements to:

Vision: Our students will achieve their highest potential in personal and academic growth, become upstanding citizens, and contribute to today's global society. Mission: Sterling High School District will serve the needs of a diverse student body by maintaining a safe and respectful learning environment, cultivating high standards of excellence, and preparing our students for life beyond high school.



Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:

The AP students achieved scores that rated about the state and global averages. Sterling has 9 AP courses with 79 students enrolled, a total of 114 AP tests were taken with 62% of AP students scoring a 3 or higher. Sterling High School was formally designated a 2021-22 No Place for Hate school after activities conducted throughout the school year promoting respect, recognizing dignity, promoting harmony, surveys and a fall activity and pledge drive. Championships were accomplished by the Boys Soccer team, Girls Volleyball team, Boys Basketball team, Boys Volleyball team, and the Boys Lacrosse team



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Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

Sterling operates on a 4x4 block schedule, students may take up to 45 credits per year. Sterling offers a comprehensive curriculum aligned to the NJ Student Learning Standards, various levels, nine AP courses and several remedial programs. Digital Applications course for 21st century learning skills was added to the curriculum in the 2020-21 school year. Teachers use a shared curriculum, common assessments, plan lessons collaboratively using best practices, and conduct monthly PLCs. Special Education staff provide programs for classified students which support diagnostic prescriptions of the YST as reflected in IEPs. Every effort is made to educate all students in the least restrictive environment.



Sports and Athletics:

Sports Offered: Baseball (Boys), Basketball (Boys & Girls), Cheerleading (Boys & Girls), Cross Country (Boys & Girls), Field Hockey (Girls), Football (Boys), Golf (Coed), Lacrosse (Boys & Girls), Soccer (Boys & Girls), Softball (Girls), Swimming (Coed), Tennis (Boys & Girls), Track and Field - Spring (Boys & Girls), Volleyball (Boys & Girls), Wrestling (Boys)



Academic Challenge, Art Club, Band-Jazz, Marching & Orchestra, Believe in U/Student Council, Chorus, Class of 2023, 2024, 2025 and 2026, FBLA, FCCLA, Graphic Design Club, GSA, Interact, Lunch Time Chat & Games, Morning News, NHS, HOSA, Project Graduation, ROTC, SADD, School Store, Spanish, Spring Musical, Tech Crew, U-Knighted by Wellness Activities, World Cultures, Writing, Yearbook, and FCA. The 3rd Annual Latin Salsa Extravaganza was held as well as Uknighted by Wellness Activities, Neurodiversity Walk, a Holiday Social sponsored by the YST and a Community-wide Trunk or Treat.



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STARS tutoring is offered on a daily basis after school. Credit Completion and Credit Recovery are also offered for students. Additional programs include the Project graduation sponsored Battle of Bands, a Talent Show, and the BIU Spirit Week & Annual Barbeque. The 2021-22 school year promoted U-Knighted by Wellness Activities throughout the school year. The Fitness Center is available every day to students of all ages and two nights per week to community members.



Staff and Professional Learning:

PLCs are scheduled once/twice per month. Both PLC and PD focus on curriculum revisions, data analysis, technology applications, and best instructional practices. With the purchase of LinkIt! as both a data analysis tool and test authoring software, teaching staff collaborated to deliver common online assessments and use the results to both assess students and drive instruction. No Place for Hate professional development was provided for staff members. Interdistrict collaboration on curriculum, instruction, and technology also takes place regularly. Crisis Prevention Intervention (de-escalation & restraint) training is offered to all Special Education staff members.



64% of the Class of 2022 are continuing their education; 38% at four year colleges, 26% at two year colleges, 5% other, 2% went into the military, and 29% of students were undecided. Our Financial Aid Night, offered in October, is conducted by representatives from HESSA. Parents and students are presented with various ways to assist students in paying for college, including tips for FAFSA completion. Our College Planning Night is offered in late May, presented by Rutgers University. We offer SAT prep courses, conduct school wide PSAT testing, and offer free waivers to students in need.



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Student Supports and Services:

ELL instruction/support, I&RS tutoring & support, after-school tutoring, tiered interventions, and resiliency programs are available for students. Guidance Counselors are available to all students and have implemented more small group meetings with students. Representatives from Family & Children's Services provide support for targeted groups of students. Classified students have case manager support, speech therapy, occupational and physical therapy as needed, and social skills support counseling. I&RS, 504s, other student specific support groups, and Child of Addiction (COA) are also offered.



Breakfast is offered on a daily basis. Health and Physical Education classes focus on fitness, nutrition, and student well-being. Electives in PE include Yoga, Pilates, PE Wellness, and Dance/Rhythm/Timing. A spring Health and Wellness Fair is organized allowing students to meet and question local organizations that specialize in Health and Wellness. YEP - Youth Empowered Program held in-person and remote, the athletic trainer offered impact testing for concussion baseline. Student health screenings are done per schedule, referrals sent as indicated, sports physicals are completed with the school physician, as needed; individual health care plans/individual emergency health care plans done when indicated; and staff member volunteers are trained as Epi pen & Glucagon delegates.



Parent and Community Involvement:

Parents may take part in information nights on academics, student well-being, Back to School nights, conferences, and the community fitness center. During the 2021-22 school year, parents took part in the U-Knighted Vision '22 Strategic Planning initiative, 1500 surveys were completed and 60 parents served as Committee Members for strategic planning. Parents have access to student academics through the parent-portal OnCourse and may access additional information through teacher websites. Additional community and parent presentations/events include Pre Prom Assembly, Parent / Project Graduation Committee, and open house Choice School Nights. Our Special Education Parent Advisory Committee is open to the public and meets bimonthly to provide parents with access to our Youth Study Team staff, guest speakers and transition planning resources. During the 2021-2022 school year Virtual Senior Parent Meetings took place to allow for safe and increased parent/guardian participation.

Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Administrators, Teachers. In the 2021-2022 school year Sterling conducted A Strategic Planning Survey that included students, parents, staff, & community members about points of pride, challenges, goals, school environment, and community partnership. Several other surveys were also conducted including a Guidance Student Survey, a Cyber Awareness Survey, a School Climate Survey, and a Schedule Survey.



The school is 62 years old. Recent improvements include installing new boilers & chillers, security system upgrades, auditorium upgrades, new unit vents in the 300 wing, complete concrete to ROTC walkway, new batting cage, dumpster pad, repatched tennis courts, updated 300 wing bathrooms, fence painting, updated several classroom floors, LED lighting and painting of classrooms, LED lighting of stadium complex, and cleaned maintenance area. The entire school is air-conditioned. In September of 2018 the district upgraded the Culinary Arts Classroom with the latest industrial appliances that equal a modern restaurant.



All doors are locked during the school day to maintain safety for all students and staff. All staff members log into Sielox every day and can use this system to trigger a lockdown/out, or to communicate a disturbance to administration and police. Sterling is in compliance with Alyssa's law, we have silent alarms in five locations. Sterling has a School Resource Officer and utilizes a visitor management system. Identification badges are worn by Staff and Students, which allows school and police to quickly recognize and deal appropriately with unauthorized visitors. We have a HIB specialist who conducts 2 school safety assemblies each year and we currently offer student workshops to increase student safety, well-being, anti-bullying, and anti-violence. Sterling has a StopIt app, an anonymous online platform to report safety misconduct or compliance concerns to help others. Sterling maintained all pandemic protocols for students, staff, and guests during the 21-22 school year.

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Sterling has completed the full 1:1 student tablet initiative, where all students are outfitted with Dell tablets. Coinciding with this initiative, staff have access to 1:1 devices and have been provided Professional Development on the use of Microsoft Class Notebooks, Microsoft Forms, and other Microsoft Educational tools. This initiative has been further supported through Danielson observation related sub domains. The Makerspace was launched in 2019 as well as a new STEM lab with robotics. A Digital Applications Course was developed for all new students to meet 21st century learning standards and provide baseline training for district technologies. Sterling High School uses Microsoft Teams as our primary student learning platform and communication hub for classes and activities.



The district has utilized ESSER funds to upgrade classroom unit ventilators, gymnasium HVAC, offer summer credit recovery, create various activities to support/address student mental health, and offer a freshmen orientation. To address learning loss Sterling has mental health and wellness activities for students and additional activities including summer credit recovery and a Makerspace are also available to students. The district has added student wellness days, a community wellness night, and several afterschool activities (culinary, yoga, meditation, art, jewelry making, makerspace activities, & book club) to assist in supporting students' mental health.



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A four by four block schedule offers students eight semester courses per year. Additional instruction opportunities are offered for credit and non-credit courses in the middle of the day. We offer Choice Programs in Allied Health, Early Childhood Education, Radio / TV Production, NJROTC, and Multi Media Graphic Design. One hundred and eighteen out-of-district students participate in these Choice offerings.
